Agenda Item 6.5: Sustainable Financing	 The Meeting: established an ideal core funding structure that strengthens the core revenue of SPREP and enables the Secretariat to leverage additional funding sources; considered a structure similar to the core funding structure of SPC, which is an increase of the SPREP support to the core from 58 percent to 80 percent which enables SPREP to be financially resilient to current and future unforeseeable events; encouraged SPREP Members and Partners to consider entering multiyear core funding partnership arrangements similar to Australia and New Zealand; and provided guidance to address sustainable financing for the long-term financial resilience of SPREP. 	Noted for consideration in the SF paper for the EB in September.

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Agenda Item 7.2: Securing climate financing to build resilience to Climate Change in the Pacific Region	 The Meeting: noted the discussion paper on 'Securing Climate Financing to build Resilience to Climate Change in the Pacific Region (WP 7.2/Att.2); noted the gaps and opportunities in accessing climate financing, in particular the opportunities available under the Adaptation Fund, and urged Members to work with SPREP to better articulate their climate change priorities for potential projects or programmes; endorsed SPREP's approach to capitalising on opportunities in the climate finance landscape in the Pacific; endorsed the multi-country SPREP Readiness proposal and encourage Members to support by allocating their respective unallocated 2021 country readiness funds. SPREP would like to also acknowledge those countries that have made commitments to support the SPREP Readiness and look forward to receiving the No Objection Letters; and encouraged Members to maximise the Readiness support programmes available for climate financing to support national and regional Direct Access Entities 	 A full paper on progress is proposed for the climate financing session of the Meeting. Some summary points are: SPREP is working with Member countries in preparing for, and articulating climate change priorities through: (a) a Readiness and NAP portfolio consisting of eight (8) projects, and (b) a project portfolio of two full-size projects (Vanuatu and FSM); (c) pipeline consisting of four full-size projects under development. Capitalising on opportunities in the climate finance landscape is outlined in a broader paper providing progress against all of the actions highlighted in the paper tabled at the 2021 SPREP Council meeting. The SPREP Readiness was supported by Solomon Islands and FSM and is going through the lengthy GCF approval process. It is expected to be approved by June 2022, noting the 12-month review and approval period of the GCF. Members are accessing their Readiness support programmes and providing support to national and regional direct access entities in various ways e.g. SPREP Readiness project; providing funds for concept note development by AEs in the Readiness proposed national DAEs to build institutional platforms etc
Agenda Item 8.1.2: Weather Ready Pacific Decadal Programme of Investment	 noted the endorsement of the Weather Ready Pacific Decadal Programme of Investment by Leaders at the 51st Pacific Islands Forum Leaders Meeting Retreat on the 6th of August 2021; acknowledged the progress made by SPREP in cooperation with the Australian Bureau of Meteorology, World Meteorological Organisation, PMC members, SPC and other partners on the request of the PMC-5 to scope a decadal Pacific regional extreme weather, water and ocean response program initiative; acknowledged funding support of the Government of Ireland towards development of the Investment plan; noted the Weather Ready Pacific Decadal Programme of Investment and progress to date; and requested the Secretariat to advocate for and seek funding for the Weather Ready Pacific Decadal Programme of Investment 	 The Secretariat provided strategic support to the PMC and Champion (Government of Tonga) of the Paper developed for the Pacific Islands Forum Leaders Meeting The WRP was endorsed in 2021 by the Pacific Leaders Forum The Secretariat continues to support the PMC by providing guidance and updates on progress of the WRP. Fiji, Samoa and the Secretariat participated virtually. Fiji and Samoa were able to make interventions virtually. The Fourth Meeting of the Open-ended Working Group on the Post-2020 Global Biodiversity Framework will be convened from 21 – 26 June 2022 in Nairobi. This meeting will continue negotiations on the Global Biodiversity Framework and on Digital Sequence information on genetic resource to produce the final draft of the framework for consideration by the Conference of the Parties. The Secretariat intends to participate virtually at the 4th meeting and encourage Members to register. An additional technical expert meeting on indicators of the post-2020 Global Biodiversity Framework will be convened from 26 June – 1 July in Bonn, Germany where the Secretariat will be attending in the meeting in Bonn in person. The dates for the Fifteenth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties (COP15) to CBD have not been announced and is scheduled for the third quarter of 2022. The Secretariat will convene a Virtual Preparatory Meeting for the COP15 in July, 2022 in preparation for the CBD COP15.
Agenda Item 8.2.2: Pacific Islands Framework for Nature Conservation and Protected Areas 2021 – 2025 and the 10 th Pacific Islands Conference on Nature Conservation and Protected Areas	 The Meeting: endorsed the Pacific Islands Framework for Nature Conservation and Protected Areas 2021 – 2025; encouraged Members and partners to support the implementation of the Framework; noted the successful virtual 10th Pacific Islands Conference; and invited Members that did not attend the high-level segment of the Nature Conference to endorse the Vemööre Declaration. 	Members who were unable to attend the High-level Segment of the Nature Conference in 2020 were invited at the 30 th SPREP meeting to endorse the Vemööre Declaration and no further endorsements were noted.

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Agenda Item 8.2.3: Pacific Coral Reef Action Plan	The Meeting: 1) endorsed the Pacific Coral Reef Action Plan; 2) encouraged Members and Partners to commit and support the cross-sectoral implementation of the Plan; and 3) directed the Secretariat to support implementation of the Plan by Members.	 Members were once again consulted (by SPREP and consultant Kate Davey) through one-on-one meetings, to determine what are the key priorities for implementation in the short term (2-5 years). – This work was funded by Government of Australia. The draft implementation plan is being developed. A decade for ocean Science project has been submitted to UNESCO for endorsement. In order to foster greater collaboration across CROP the Project will sit within the broader pacific Program under the PCCOS. The first project under the decade is being developed with Australia, France, the Global Coral Reef Monitoring Network and relevant scientific organisations. This project will develop a community based monitoring and awareness project to be rolled out across the Pacific Working with MNRE of Samoa to develop pilots on coral reef restoration and monitoring at several site across Samoa Development of communications products including Webpage, Teaser video and written materials to promote and inform on the Plan and its implementation.
Agenda Item 8.3.1: Strategic planning and management of disaster waste	 Supported and committed to establishing Environment sectors (with disaster waste included) within National Disaster Management Offices to address disaster waste and other environmental issues; and directed the Secretariat to work with Members and Partners in seeking assistance from the FRDP PRP in the establishment of a Regional Disaster Waste Management Taskforce. 	Work is in progress by the PWP towards assisting Members establish environment sectors within the National Disaster Management Offices that involves developing the following: a template for national and community disaster waste management plan with drafting/guiding instructions; a structure for the establishment of an Environment Sector Working Group (EWG); and a standard methodology for estimating and recording of disaster waste and biodiversity loss and damages following a natural disaster. PWP will pilot these tools in one Member country before finalising and publication.

Some of the key activities include: delivery of a Sustainable Financing "Deep Dive" hosted by PWP and J-PRISM II, at the 3rd Clean Pacific Roundtable where the 21 step Pathway was introduced and schemes discussed with approx 80 participants https://www.cleanpacificroundtable.com/recordings-day4 ; completion of 8 feasibility studies on the implementation or expansion of sustainable financing schemes in Cook Is, Kiribati, Republic of the Marshall Islands, Nauru, Niue, Samoa, Solomon Is, and Vanuatu; developed "Design it Yourself" resources developed and released to assist and with initial states of the 21 step Pathway and designing a Sustainable Financing scheme; assistance provided to Cook Is and Vanuatu during the design of scheme and drafting of regulation/legislation; developing a toolkit resource for governments to use to effectively consider Gender Equality Disability Social Inclusion (GEDSI) in sustainable financing scheme design; and partnering with the UNEP Green Forum/Community of Practice initiative and currently designing a webinar that will be used to launch the Community of Practise.
